








THE PERFECT SEND-OFF

In recent months, because of the pandemic, funerals (when allowed), have been smaller affairs than families might have liked. Many of us may have imagined how we would have liked to say goodbye properly, or how we'd like our own funeral to be when the time comes. What music would we like? Would we rather it be a celebration of the life of the person who has died or an occasion to share our sadness with other people who also knew them? Could it be both?

In some countries, funerals are celebrated with joyful music, whereas in other countries, funerals are more sombre affairs. Some traditions have frowned upon the very idea of crying at a funeral, whereas others went to the effort of paying crying mourners to attend funerals. In Ireland and Scotland it is a tradition to hold wakes (funeral parties), and in Ghana, some people like to build colourful, extravagantly shaped coffins representing the dead person's passions (guitars, boats, flowers, cars, and even mobile phones!).







